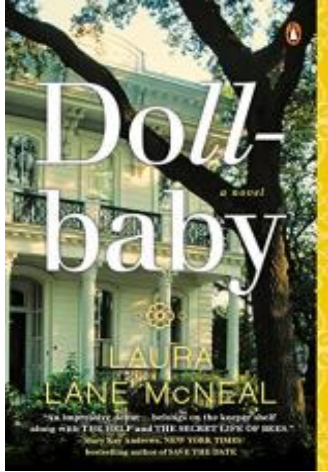


Dollbaby

About the Book

When Ibbey Bell's father dies in the summer of 1964, her mother Vidrine deposits the 11-year-old with her eccentric grandmother Fannie Bell, whom she didn't know existed. Fannie, who lives in a decrepit Victorian mansion in Uptown New Orleans, tends to wind up in the local asylum every now and then. Her black cook, Queenie, who runs the household, and Queenie's outspoken daughter, Dollbaby, take young Ibbey under their wing and initiate her into the ways of the South --- both its grand traditions as well as its darkest secrets. As Ibbey uncovers the ghosts of her family's past, she learns that family can be found in places you least expect it.

Uplifting and funny, poignant and full of verve, DOLLBABY is a novel of Southern eccentricity, secrets and charm. Fans of Sue Monk Kidd, Pat Conroy and Harper Lee won't want to miss this one!

Discussion Guide

1. Ibbey's arrival to Fannie's home is the catalyst for change. How does Ibbey transform the household?
2. Ibbey is warned early on not to ask Fannie about her past. Why is she given this advice?
3. Why does Vidrine leave Ibbey with Fannie? Later, after four years, why does Vidrine suddenly come back and what does she wish to achieve from the visit?
4. As Ibbey lives in Fannie's house, she begins to uncover its hidden truths, both physically and emotionally. What secrets does the house hide, and what do they mean to her?

5. In some ways Fannie is very old-fashioned, yet in other ways she seems quite progressive for someone of her era. How would you characterize her, and why?
6. Dollbaby wants to participate in the civil rights protests but Queenie tries to discourage her. What is the difference between their views on the issue and why do you think they differ?
7. As the era unfolds, what are its political effects on Fannie's household? How do the realities of race and class trickle down to affect the characters' lives?
8. Fannie tells Ibbie that she must be "willing to live the life that is waiting for you." What does she mean by this, and how does the advice relate to both of their lives?
9. Through this novel McNeal seems to suggest that family is what we make it. How does Ibbie's adopted family influence the person she ultimately becomes?
