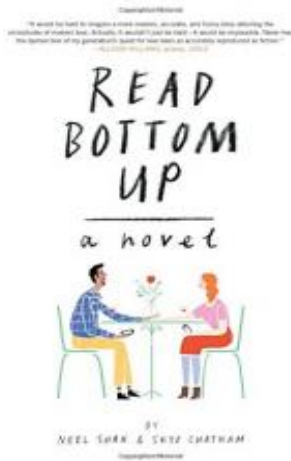


Read Bottom Up

Discussion Guide

5. Were you rooting for Elliot and Madeline to make it as a couple, or did you have reservations about the relationship from the beginning? How did watching their relationship unfold in real-time work for you versus just hearing about it from a third person narrator?

6. This book is just as much about modern friendship as it is about modern dating. Which friend are you in your inbox: the Madeline or the Emily; the Elliot or the David?

7. Did you see the ending coming? Were you happy about it?

8. Share your own nightmare dating story with your book club!

9. What do you think Madeline or Elliot could have done differently to avoid relationship hell? Or are relationships like theirs part of life?
