
Seal Woman

About the Book

Description: In the rubble of post-World War II Berlin, artist Charlotte flees her past and everything she's lost by responding to an ad calling for strong women who can cook and do farm work in Iceland. But painful memories and ghosts follow Charlotte as she struggles to make a new life in a raw and rugged landscape. This debut novel celebrates the twin powers of storytelling and art as ways to reassemble the fragments of Charlotte's broken self and move her-and everyone she loves-toward peace. This novel won first prize for fiction from the Maryland Writers' Association.

- 7. How does the character of Charlotte grow and change in the course of the novel?
- **8.** What does Charlotte learn about art from Max?

9. What does she learn about art on her own?

10. How does she apply art in her personal struggle?
